## VOCATION

A vocation, Latin for "calling", is a term for an occupation to which a person is specially drawn or for which they are suited, trained or qualified. . .

Though now often used in secular contexts, the meanings of the term originated in Christianity. The idea of vocation is central to the Christian belief that God has created each person with gifts and talents oriented toward specific purposes and a way of life. This idea of vocation is especially associated with a divine call to service to the Church and humanity through particular vocational life commitments ... In the broader sense, Christian vocation includes the use of one's gifts in their profession, family life, church and civic commitments for the sake of the greater common good.

## Prayerful discernment

We may perhaps think of discernment as a process of decision making. In the Christian context, however... discernment is a spiritual practice. Through prayer, meditation, or mindfulness we seek to open ourselves to the movement of God in our lives and in our world. We also understand that the Spirit of God works through the feedback of others and our church in helping us to discern. Discernment is not, then, simply between ourselves and God. Discernment recognizes that sometimes God speaks through others and through the community. Discernment is listening. Discernment is work. Spiritual Directors or Spiritual Friends can be very helpful in our discernment processes. The formal practices of discernment of call through our Presbytery can also be meaningful and helpful if we struggle with call to ministry in the church.

**Explorefaith.org** has a list of questions to prayerfully consider in discernment processes:

1. *What kind of life am I being called to create for my self?*
2. *When discernment seems difficult, and decisions hard to make, what brings peace to my mind?*
3. *Who are the people who help me reach inner clarity?*
4. *How do the uneven edges of indecisiveness actually lead me closer to a decision?*
5. *How can discernment deepen my relationship with God?*
6. *How can I stay centered when clarity feels distant?*
7. *How is discernment more a process of discovery than decision-making?*
